#### ONCE OPERATED **BUSINESS HERE** MARK CLARK DIES

A lifetime resident of Georgetown and Glen' Williams, Mark Clark, 84, passed away late Friday afternoon, July 12th. His death was the result of a stroke suffered while in Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital. He had undergone an operation and was recovering nicely, and expected to be released this week. Mr. Clark had been in ill health for the past year and a half.

Born in Glen Williams, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Clark, he had lived in the Glen until his marriage to Margaret Alice McKinnon, in 1916, when they moved to Georgetown. Clark predeceased him on July 14th, 1954. . He received his education in the Glen and Georgetown and as a young man was employed at Beaumont's Woollen Mill and the lower mill of Provincial Paper.

Later he became a familiar figure in the business life of Main Street; working for many years in grocery stores operated by the late A: M. Grandy and John McDermott. Shortly after the first world war Mr. Clark purchased the grocery store and bakery known as the Georgetown Cooperative, and operated it until the early 30s. During that time he ser-

As a young man he was a keen amateur photographer, taking and developing his own! pictures, evidence of which remain in the form of pictures of people and events at the turn of the century. For many years he was active in band work, belonging to the old Glen Band . and later to Georgetown Cityzens Band

St. George's Church and in earlier days in St Alban's, Glen Williams. From his retirement from the lower paper mill on its closure, he acted as sexton at St George's Mr Clark took a keen interest in the affairs of his community and was a worker for many years in the Conser vative party. 
