One Out of Four Failed**

Dear Sir:

Summarizing the promotion list of the Georgetown High School as printed in the Georgetown Herald and analyzing the obtained figures we come to the conclusion that one out of four students failed completely. In addition to this 12.9% of the students passed 16.5% higher grade conditionally and 6.1% failed one or two subjects which must be repeated in a lower grade. This means that only 56% of the students passed to a higher grade without any conditions or having to repeat one or two subjects.

These figures are based on a total number of 775 students (grade 13 not included). It is understood that there are 800 students. We estimated that 25 of these wrote grade 13 exams. These examination results are not yet published.

Assuming that the above figures are correct, I can only conclude that there is something wrong. The results are far below what we may expect. Our first reaction is to blame the High School Staff for this poor result. However, this is very unfair. After giving it some more thought we must point our finger at the students and indirectly at the parents.

If the parents are not concerned about their child's education, why should the students be? If there is no discipline at home, how can we expect that the teachers are able to maintain the proper discipline in the school. As long as the student thinks that he has the right to spend the family allowance money in restaurants and on sex literature, as long as the girls dress like models, must have their "steady" and have to be popular; so long we can not expect to have the proper atmosphere for educating our teenagers so that they may develop into responsible citizens.

The results of this we can observe on the shopping plaza and on the Main Street in Georgetown every night. To the parents I would like to say that they have the responsibility to see that their child does not waste the tax money of other citizens. Do not try to blame the teachers. It is not in the teacher's interest that so many students fail. There are standards they have to meet. Without the help of the parents they have a near impossible task.
