## EDITORIAL COMMENT

Students Need Guidance..

Vocational guidance counselling might well be on the increase in the immediate future. The need for greater attention to this important phase of education is becoming increasingly clear.

With a disturbing record of nearly. one-quarter failure in the first year at the University of Toronto, last year, it would seem that the chairman of the Toronto YMCA counselling service. Frank Lawson, well-known investment broker, is right when he claims: "About 75 per cent of high school youngsters don't know what they want in life and many end up in universities that shouldn't be there at all."

Mr. Lawson has given a great deal of thought to the subject of professional counsellors in schools and universities. He has been chairman of the Toronto 'Y' counselling service since 1944. Three years ago he established the Counselling Foundation of Canada, that offers financail assistance for the training of counsellors.

With this background, the most serious consideration should be given to his charge that "it could well be that we don't need all those new university classrooms. More important: "We're encouraging an appalling waste of manpower."

The director of the Toronto 'Y' counselling service. Dr G P. Gosgrave, one of Canada's foremost authorities in counselling, is on record as declaring: "Organization such as ours are providing emergency services. Schools should be providing ling from the elementary level right . up through technical colleges and universities."

Most school counsellors are leachers who have taken summer courses in counselling and devote spare time, only to this work among pupils." At the University level, some western universities provide fair-- ly thorough counselling services but in eastern colleges, it is usually only a partitime job for the employment placement director or a professor.

Proper counselling involves sound training in psychology, wrapped up in .intelligence and aptitude testing and special interviewing techniques. In short, its a specialists' job and should never be turned; over to an amateur, regardless of his or her interest or dedication to the importance of the subject. A good deal of harm with perhaps very little good could-come from their efforts.

Often a student needs more than mere, quidance in selecting a career; he needs advice on personal problems. This calls for counselling by guidance experts with honours, preferably, in psychology plus a minimum of two years of specialized graduate work; then full time application to

Many of the problems associated with vocational counselling will be discussed next November at the first national seminar on guidance and counselling, sponsored by the Canadian Association for Adult Education. It is hoped that a counselling association will emerge. That would be a solid step.


