Liptrott's 75 Paces Amateurs Best of Five Clubs Compete

The long anticipated meeting of the champions of North Halton Golf and Country Club and Georgetown Golf and Country Club almost came off Saturday. But for the second time this season a late cancellation prevented the two from playing competitively in a tournament.

The North Halton title holder is Harry Chappel and the wearer of the crown at Georgetown Golf and Country is Bob Liptrott.

They would have competed against each other in a Georgetown-North Halton inter-club scheduled earlier but cancelled as the playing date approached because neither club was apparently going to muster a team in time.

An inter-club involving the top six golfers from Credit Valley, Bolton, Trafalgar, North Halton, Brampton and Georgetown would also have placed the two local club champs on the same course in competition Saturday but North Halton notified the host Georgetown club Friday that a previously scheduled two ball foursome would have to take precedence and the meeting was off again.

Liptrott was red but he fired a three-over par 75 in the journey to take top honours over all the competing amateurs including well known touring amateur Bruce Castal or whose 76 was second low Liptrott's golfing buddy, another Georgetown Golf and Country Club team member Doug Worsnop was third with a 78.

Georgetown Golf and Country Club professional Doug Burton and Trafalgar pro Roy Boman tied with the day's low scores when they both carded 74.
