Ex-Mayor Says 1937 Was Real Centennial

I think this would be an appropriate time for the Mayor to come by Helicopter from Brampton CHIC radio, land on one of the tulip islands on Main St. and if there is any speech left after his speech there, he can give some to the Georgetown folks, maybe throw in a few sausage, Deputy Reeve Hunter could arrange to blow the whistles of all industries that have been established in recent years in Milton, Acton, Brampton, Orangeville and etc. instead of Georgetown and Rev. John Elliott may be observed in a float carrying the budget with an expression of concern and doubt if the Town could afford to pay the bill of the Mayor's 1964 p.u.w.w. I suggest a few more secret meetings might provide a clue to the Municipal Council should no doubt take the initiative and with your approval it is my intention to call a public meeting in the near future and if the citizens are sufficiently interested, we should not miss this opportunity of advertising Georgetown as one of the best towns for its size and population on the North American continent.

The records also show at a meeting of the Municipal Council, Feb. 2nd, 1937, at which I, the president, Col. James Ballantine and Dr. F. R. Watson addressed the Council in regard to the celebration of Georgetown's Centennial, asking the Council to take the initiative and call a general meeting of the citizens to form an organization and at the meeting the following resolution was presented and carried, unanimously: Moved by James Costigan, seconded by G. W. Davis that whereas according to information received by this Council and the best records of the municipality available at the present time, the first citizens resided in Georgetown in the year 1837 and the first industry was established in that year and whereas many citizens have signified their desire that the people of the Town of Georgetown should fittingly celebrate the one hundredth year of its existence and progress. Therefore be it resolved that this Municipal Council by this Municipal Council to all the churches, organizations and citizens generally to assist in this matter and that Col. James Ballantine be appointed general chairman for organizing purposes and Reeve Davis as vice-chairman. Carried.

The foregoing is an exact copy of the minutes in the Clerk's office and they may be seen by any person, together with other records pertaining to the Georgetown Centennial of 1937.
