Halton Member Chairs Committee on Drugs

Halton's Member of Parliament, Dr. Harry Harley, was elected Thursday as chairman of the House of Commons special committee on drugs and pesticides.

As had been predicted earlier this week, Dr. Harley was the unanimous choice of the 24-man committee which held its organizational meeting on Thursday afternoon.

Ridger Mitchell, MP for Sudbury and a pharmacist, was named vice-chairman.

Dr. Harley said he would be introducing the committee's first report in Parliament Friday. It will be a routine report, but it will be a significant one, he said, in that it will be the first time that the House of Commons will have a committee to deal with the safety of drugs.

The steering committee will meet in the interim but the full committee will not meet until October, he said.

The chairman said the committee has been provided with copies of the report of the committee established in the United States by President Kennedy dealing with insecticides and pesticides.

It is our hope that committee members will study the report during the recess and when we meet in the fall we will start to call witnesses.
