The Jacobin plover is commonly referred to as the "Aristocrat of the Pigeon Family". When the Jacobin plover struts or "shows off" it pulls the long feathers around its neck up in a circle completely covering its head except for a slight opening in the front for its eye. This resembles a hood and that is how the Jacobin got its name. The Jacobin monks during the reign of James the II of England wore a hood over their heads, so these plover were named Jacobins because of their hood of feathers.

These plovers were originally known as Cyprus plovers and are referred to as long as 1603. Finding evidence to the contention that the birds may have come from an Eastern Country to Cyprus and then to England where they were discovered. The name Jacobin they were given.

They are one of the earliest birds to be imported to the United States. The first authentic record shows the Jacobin was shown in the USA in 1873 and soon after made its way into Canada.

Ed McLean, and an Hon. Norval have had Jacobin birds for the past ten years and was a breeder as a young boy. He had a pair of the birds at the time he lived in the East held in Toronto. However, he said his birds when he left home to set to work about 10 years ago and his son Ron brought the stud of a Jacobin breeder who had to move from Ontario to land and had no place for his birds. Since then they have bred and worked with the birds to improve them and quickly won top honours at Canadian shows especially at their Whites. They imported some Blacks from the USA and Scotland as there are no Blacks left in Canada and now top winners in Blacks also.

They bred a pair of Whites and they are now sold as on Blues and Whites which are quite scarce anywhere in the world and are very priced with a good crop of young birds in these colours this year.

About 5 years ago the McLeans decided to enter their birds in the Jacobin Meets in

the USA and have many trophies to show for their efforts. They have proved that the birds were top quality and that they were not just a passing fancy.

At the C.N.I. (Canadian National Interbreeders) Show at St. Catharines, Ontario, in 1958, the McLeans won a pair of Blacks and a pair of Whites. They have since won many more trophies and are now considered one of the top breeders in the world.

The McLeans are now breeding a pair of Whites and a pair of Blacks and are looking for a good home for their birds.

PEPPERMINT FROST WITH STRAWBERRY SAUCE (MAKES 4 SERVINGS)

1/2 cup melted peppermint candy
 1/2 cup marshmallow whip
 1/2 cup hot water

2 1/2 cups whipped instant skim milk powder
 1 cup fresh strawberries, crushed
 2 tablespoons sugar

Combine peppermint candy, marshmallow whip and hot water. Stir until blended. Cool. Fold into whipped instant skim milk powder. Place in refrigerator tray. Freeze until firm (about 3 hours). Combine strawberries and sugar, mix well. Serve strawberry sauce over Frost.

*To whip instant pasteurized powdered skim milk (Makes about 2 1/2 cups)
 1. Stir 1/2 cup instant skim milk powder into 1/2 cup ice water.
 2. Whip until soft peaks form (3 to 4 minutes). Add 2 table-spoons lemon juice.
 3. Continue whipping until stiff peaks form (5 to 10 minutes longer).
