Sales, Income Rise For Standard Firm

Net income after taxes of the Standard Products Company climbed to a six-year high of \$1,253,746 during the year ended June 30th, an increase of 48 per cent over the preceding year, James S. Reid, president, announced today.

Earnings per share of the manufacturer of automotive parts and building products were \$1.62 on 774,797 shares outstanding at the fiscal year end compared with \$1.12 on 773,047 shares a year ago.

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
