## COUNTY COUNCIL BRIEFS

Halton County Council met for four and a half hours last week and still had to leave to next month the passing of nine by-laws. They adjourned after six-thirty, having rushed through two months' business, committee reports and accounts.

The council endorsed a County of Peterborough resolution asking the provincial government to pay the entire cost of high school teachers' salaries.

A policy of paying 50% of local municipalities' share of the costs for short arm water on all county road connecting links, as well as paying the municipalities' share of cost of maintenance, was given approval.

The Agricultural Committee reported it was dissatisfied with the way the Department of Lands and Forests is looking after reforestation properties. The Committee has written the department to ask for a report on their management of reforestation areas in Halton.

Deputy Reeve G. Gallagher of Burlington with some pride announced the Department of Highways was improving the bottleneck at Highway 401 near Mohawk Raceway, saying, "The County Road Committee asked for this." Deflating him was Nassagaweya Deputy Reeve W. Coulter, who said, "The township brought it to their attention over two years ago."

Georgetown's Deputy Reeve W. Hunter, and Nassagaweya Deputy Reeve W. Coulter were delegated to attend a Department of Travel and Publicity meeting to set up a regional tourist council.

Plans were made to furnish an office for the Warden, with a desk, a swivel chair, walnut chair, desk pad and chest-of-drawers, at a cost of \$714.

The clerk was asked to obtain information on automatic court reporting machines for use in the courts.

## That Champagne Pump

The final chapter in the case of the champagne pump was played out at Council Monday night. The by-laws authorizing the installation and payment were read.

While the pump cost \$10,000, only \$4,836 had to be debentured since there was \$11,261 in unexpended debentures, still available.

A motion to sell the debentures to Bell Gouinlock & Co. at par with 6% interest, was passed but not without debate. Reeve Elliott and Deputy Reeve Hunter felt they should be put up for bids. "It is not a competitive bid, since there is no competition," complained the Reeve.

Coun. Powers felt it would be a waste of time for such a small amount, especially since 6% at par was perfectly acceptable. The mayor agreed, "6% at par is a good price on today's market," he stated.

The Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Coun. Young opposed the motion.

Coun. Young objected to the fact advertising costs should be included in the debenture. He felt at least one notice of the water shut-off should be charged to the contractor, since he felt it was his responsibility.

The mayor replied that this only stated the advertising costs could be included, not that they were included.

Closing the subject was Coun. Powers reply to Reeve Elliott's query about the condition of the pump. "It is A-1, we now have enough pumping facilities for the foreseeable future, without falling back on the diesel," said Coun. Powers. "It was meant for emergencies only," he concluded.
