Deaconess Dedicated Life's Work to Church

Miss Anne Agnes Noble, ATW, died at her home, 94 Herkshire Ave., Toronto, on August 22nd. Born at Norval on August 31, 1878, she was the youngest daughter of Robert and Marion Laing Noble. She attended public school in the village of Brampton High School and later for two years at the University of Toronto. She was a member of the Presbyterian Ladies College and the Presbyterian Deaconess Training Home.

On graduation in 1917, she took the position of deaconess of Queen St. East Presbyterian Church. She retired in 1944. The church was her life. She was the first secretary of the Norval Women's Institute and choir leader and a Sunday School teacher at Norval Presbyterian Church. While at the Toronto church she served the needs of people who were members of her church or not. In appreciation of her service a stained glass window was unveiled in the church after her retirement.

The highlight of her recital on graduation from the conservatory in 1898 was her recitation of "I Know that My Redeemer Liveth from Hand to Mouth." This was the key to her life.
