Ed Warren, who would normally be classed as physically handicapped, certainly exhibits none of the shortcomings one would associate with short stumps rather than arms and hands. Ed's dexterity with his man-made arms and hands is overshadowed only by his amazing abilities without them.

A sports jacket equipped with a type of shoulder harness acts as the vehicle for carrying the artificial limbs. The harness through delicate shoulder movements, transmits a limited movement to the hands. This lack, however is considered a nuisance by Ed and is used merely for decorative purposes. The motto on more required to take out and light a cigarette with the artificial aids is cut to seconds when the stumps move into action.

Ed lost his limbs in an accident with an automatic presser in England at the age of 14. A cheerful outlook coupled with the body's natural adaptability have over the years greatly decreased the loss, in Ed's mind at least.

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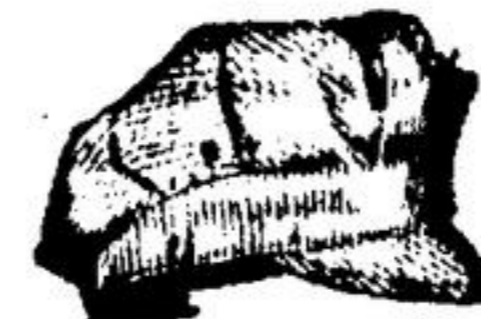
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
