### Small Farmers Important To Halton, Kerr Says

George A. Kerr, Conservative candidate for Halton in the coming Provincial election told a packed meeting in Stewarttown on Monday that the Robarts government believed the small farmer was an irreplaceable part of the economy of Halton County. He added it had given leadership in scientific research, agricultural education, increased production and orderly marketing farm products.

Stressing the achievements of the present Conservative Provincial government, he told his listeners that in 1962 it had assisted the 2,503 Junior Extension of 411 Clubs, in the prov-

ince. These clubs under the guidance of County Representatives of the Dept. of Agriculture had completed over 30,000 projects.

He added that the Dept. of Agriculture plans to increase to \$40,000 the amount of money that may be advanced on mortgages on farms, under the Junior Farmers Establishment Act. Under provisions of this Act a Junior Farmer can borrow, from the government up to 80 per cent of the value of his farm. At present the ceiling for such loans is \$20,000. The mortgages can run for periods up to 30 years. In the past 10 years nearly \$4,000,000 has been loaned under this act.

**Milk Control**  
Mr. Kerr said that amendments to the Milk Industry Con-

trol Act will give the producer more control over their product. "This program of granting liberal assistance to young farmers is proof of the Robarts government's interest in the Agricultural Industry. The program is based on two principles, the way of life symbolized by the family farm and the need to keep it prosperous and productive in a changing economy," he said.
