Fete Ambulancemen For Alliston Assistance

Several members of the Executive of the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service who had been instrumental in encouraging a group of interested citizens of Alliston, in forming a Volunteer Ambulance Service, attended an "in appreciation" dinner at the Doran Motor Hotel in Alliston, last Wednesday.

The Executive of the Alliston Volunteer Ambulance Association arranged the evening dinner and with the Georgetown group for the assistance given them last December and in the past few months in their efforts to buy it and its equipment. The Chevrolet V8, with automatic transmission, was supplied by the local dealer at his exact invoice cost. Funds were raised by public subscription, with the major industries contributing very generously, as well as the citizens and business houses.

One of the highlights of the fund raising drive was the fact that the Ontario Provincial Police detachment undertook to hold a dinner dance at ten dollars per couple and with the Georgetown group for the assistance given them last December and in the past few months in their efforts to buy it and its equipment.

All drivers and attendants in the ambulance are housed free of charge in a truck warehouse and the billing for calls is done by the secretary of one of the members find volunteers to operate their beautiful new vehicle on a twenty-four hour basis, but they went out and found the service to the community.

Charge Kerr Violates Poster Posting Deal

The campaign manager for Liberal standard bearer in the upcoming Provincial election in Halton County, Owen Mullin, has charged that the P.C. candidate, George Kerr, has violated his own agreement to refrain from placing election posters on town property.

In a letter to Kerr's headquarters, P. R. Blake said, "Having gone to such great lengths to publicize as 'your idea' our informal agreement not to deface the streets of Halton with signs I consider it a breach of faith that you were first to do so."

Blake charged the Kerr posters had been put on town property along No. 2 Highway, on the Guelph-Line and on Highway 25 to Acton.

"The residents of Halton I know will express their indignation at the polls for the poster war you have precipitated," states Blake.

Derailment Disrupts Traffic on Rail Line

Traffic on the Toronto-Stouffville C.N.R. line was disrupted early Friday, Aug. 23rd, when five cars were derailed on the No. 1 siding at Acton Limestone Quarry, west of Georgetown. Two of the derailed hopper-type gravel cars blocked the main line until 2:30 p.m. when a work train from London lifted the cars off the track.

A CNR crew was putting empty gravel cars on the siding when the lead car jumped over a derailing device and an open switch. The cars followed the rails onto the main line, rolling over the ties and gravel roadbed. Further west, the movement of the engine pushing the cars buckled the train and three more cars left the track.

Wheel trucks of the lead car were knocked off and the wheels and body of the car came to rest on the south side of the crossing at the fourth line of Esquesing. Damage to the lead car was estimated at \$350 and the second car at \$150. Rails on the siding and main line were displaced and the section gang realigned the track before the 2:30 p.m. No. 6 passenger train passed through.

The accident occurred about 2:30 a.m. The work train with its huge crane, arrived at the site about noon. By 2:30 p.m. four cars had been lifted back onto the tracks and the fifth and most seriously damaged had been lifted clear of the line. By Friday evening, the track and switches had been realigned and traffic on the line was back to normal.

Urges Planning Now For Better Highway

Improvements next year to No. 7 Highway through town should be in the planning stage now, Reeve Elliott told council last week.

He pointed out that 90 per cent of the cost is paid by senior governments and the remaining 10 per cent which the town must pay could be subject to a 25 per cent forgiveness clause under the new Municipal Loan Act legislation.

"We should be getting costs, and seeing if there is survery work to be done," he said.

Road chairman, Wm. F. Hunter explained that there is no money in this year's budget for any highway work and he has no intention of saddling next year's committee with debt.

"I know it should be started now, but that's the trouble with a council elected for one year," he said. "If it was a two-year term we could do something now."

If he is on council next year, he hopes action can be taken, he added.
