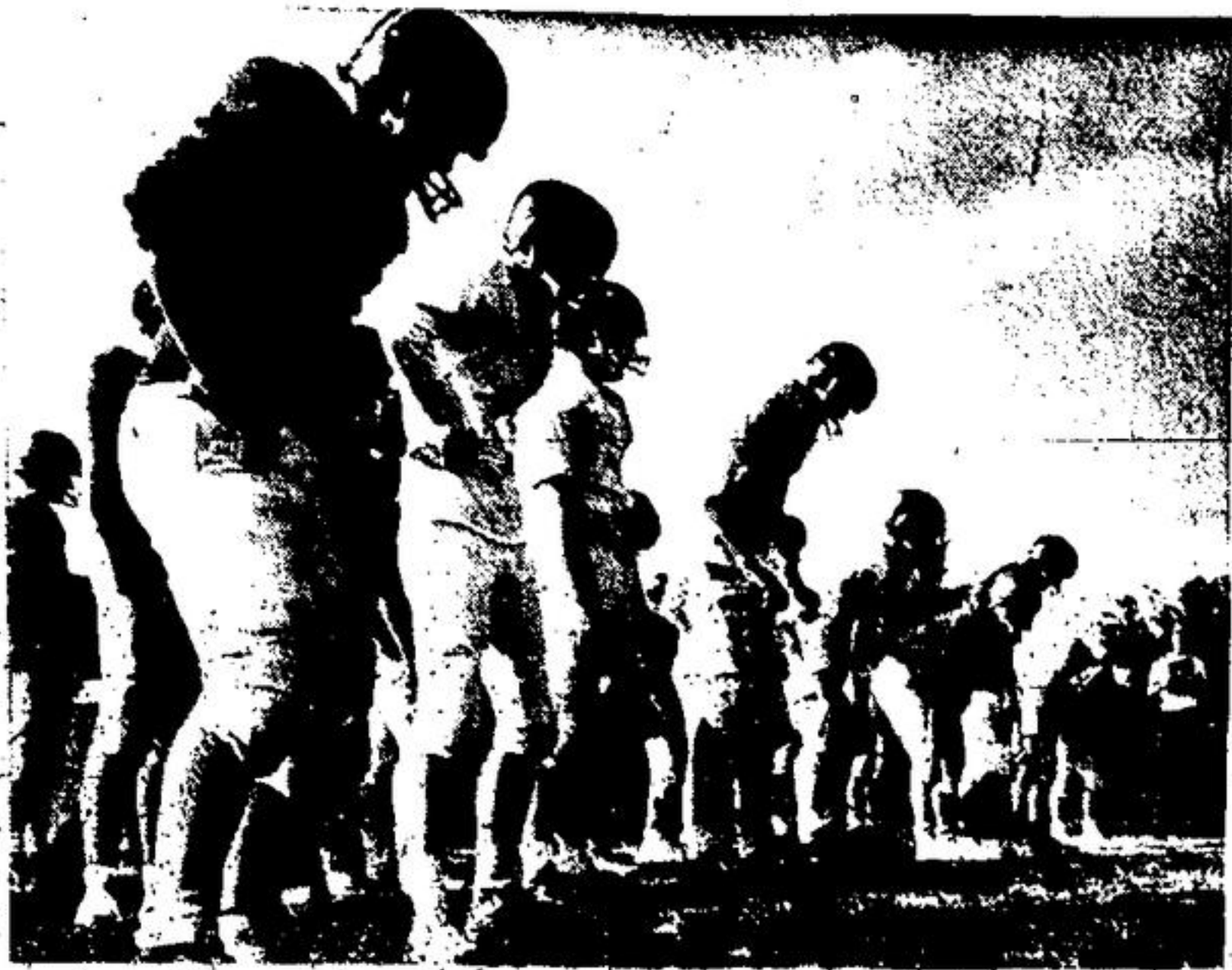


Head Knockers At It....

McLaren Throws Veterans, Rookies Against Guelph Gridders Friday

Head GHS football coach Lyn McLaren will step out of his Phys Ed Department into Maths tomorrow afternoon in Guelph where he will be seeking an unknown quantity.

The unknown quantity is his senior football team. The Rebels are either a collection of leftovers patched with juniors and rookies or a hard core nucleus of veterans bolstered with last year's outstanding juniors and talented first-year men.
