Junior farmers from R R 1, Norval, and Hornby will get a shot at the world ploughing championship at the International Ploughing Match next month. John Wilson and Dwight May earned the right to be Canadian representatives Saturday when they finished 1-2 in the Halton County Junior Farmer Ploughing Championships on the Fred Nurse Farm, R R 2, Georgetown. It was the second year in succession that John, son of Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Wilson, had won the county Junior title. They competed in the Under 21 Class against other district ploughers Ken Robinson and Don Brander, both of Norval, in the Under 16 Class, Brian Marshall of R R 4, Milton was the winner, and the first girl to contest the title in five years, Verna Thompson of Burlington, was second. They defeated Ron Brander of Norval and Jim Deley, the youngest ploughman in the match at 12. Judge Ray Monahan showered the competitors with compliments. "I've never seen furrows so straight ploughed by people so young," he said after the matches. The International Ploughing Match will be held on the Conn Smythe farm at Caledon next month.

East of Baillie's Creek to 18 Mile Creek, south of the Queen Elizabeth Way, 228 Colborne St. E., John Ham, Revising Officer. 18 Mile Creek to East Town Line, south of the Queen Elizabeth Way, 282 Colborne St. E., Brian W. King, Revising Officer. Everything north of the Queen Elizabeth Way, 168 Colborne St. E., T. M. Holden, Revising Officer. In Burlington there are two Courts of Revision. For the area west of the Guelph Line the Court will be at 2051 Lakeshore Road, John S. Stephens, Revising Officer. For the area east of the Guelph Line, the Court will be at 672 Brant Street, E. Hourigan, Revising Officer. In Milton the Court of Revision will be held at 207 Mary
