They know the temptations that lead young people to want to leave school. Earning money and feeling grown up may seem more attractive than getting a good education. School discipline may seem tiresome and the subjects taught may seem pointless.

Lack of Interest
Lack of interest in school work leads to failure and failure leads to discouragement. There may be a desire to leave friends who have already dropped out of school and are earning their own money.

These are strong temptations to deal with. However, for their own good, young people must realize that if discipline seems tiresome at school, business and industry also have disciplines which, if disregarded, will lead not to failure in examinations but to loss of employment.

Earning his own money may look like true independence to a 16-year-old but he should look ahead 10 years.

Will the young man or woman of 26 be satisfied with the same job? Will the wages look as big then in light of current changes, will the job even exist?

Do Best Now
To do your best in your future job, you must do your best now. Make the most of your schooling. Take advantage of every opportunity that presents itself. Learn all you can in school. You will find, at some time during your working life you will use all you have learned. The further you advance in your working life the more you will need your education.

I am not suggesting that a university education is for every boy and girl. However, I do believe that every student should get as much education as he or she is capable of mastering.

Young people who leave school before obtaining as much education as they are capable of acquiring are in effect giving themselves a voluntary pay cut for the rest of their working lives.

Statistics prove that by the time a man who has a high school education reaches his peak earning period he is earning 20 per cent more than the man who dropped out of school. According to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, each year of high school adds \$200 a year to your income for the rest of ones earning lifetime and the matriculation year adds \$466 a year, again for the rest of ones earning lifetime.

Based on this information it is obvious that a decision to leave school too soon will affect your standard of living for the rest of your life. Therefore it is not a decision you should make in haste. If in doubt talk it over with your parents, your guidance counsellor and the educational counselor at your National Employment Office. Education is achievement. It is smart to stay in school.
