

### Mullin Claims Milk Producers Bribed With Their Own Money

Liberal candidate in the coming provincial election, Owen Mullin, lashed out at the Tory government last Friday evening when speaking to a full house in Esqueping Township, Halton, for "bribing the milk producers and farmers of this district with their own money."

### BRAMPTON

Peel County's system of government is "doomed" Mayor Russel Prouse said Monday night. With Brampton and Toronto Township both moving for city status, the concept of county government as we have known it for the past century is finished, he said.

### ORANGEVILLE

James L. Cooke of Orangeville won the Liberal nomination for the Dufferin-Simcoe riding in the forthcoming provincial election. Four other candidates were nominated and declined in favour of Mr. Cooke.

### BRONTE

Members of the Bronte Branch of the Canadian Legion got fall activities underway with a meeting Thursday after their first-ever summer shutdown. They hope to raise the funds to build their own quarters.

### OAKVILLE

An upsurge in building work has put Oakville's smaller construction companies in the money this summer — despite early fears that new government building materials taxes would kill the trade.

### BURLINGTON

Council last week gave the third reading and final approval to a by-law authorizing spending \$650,000.00 for the construction of the town's new civic administration building.

### COOKSVILLE

Workers for Peel riding Liberal candidate were busy taking down their posters the day after putting them up. Police ordered them removed after they appeared on several Cooksville streets in contravention of a by-law. The Conservative and NDP candidates have not violated the law.

### MILTON

Three modern stores topped by seven office suites will be built at the corner of Charles and Main Streets in Milton on property formerly owned by the estate of Mrs. M. E. Gowland. A bank or trust company would be one of the tenants, the new owners Mr. and Mrs. Ollen speculated.

### ACTON

Acton High School board wants to add five rooms to the school now instead of the original 11 rooms they agreed on earlier. Council discussed the proposal Monday but Esqueping and Nassagaweya will be consulted before approval is given.

### ERIN

A Senior Citizens' low rental apartment building will be constructed in Erin. The Legion has purchased the site for the 11-unit building and the Erin council will take over ownership of the building through a tax rebate arrangement. It will belong to the village in forty five years.
