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Boer War Veteran Writes of Service

The History of the Lorne Scots which has been running in The Herald for several issues, has drawn many comments. Of particular interest is a letter from a Boer War veteran written to the Lorne Scots.

As a military man of 50 years, I find the write-up in our local papers on the Lorne Scots quite interesting. While I have had no connection with the present Lorne Scots set up, I did have for many years an active connection with the old 20th Lorne Rifles.

I first attended the Niagara Camp in 1901, when I was 16 years old. If I remember rightly, Colonel Goodwin of Georgetown was the Officer Commanding at that time. They in 1902 I joined the 2nd Canadian Mounted Rifles and went out to South Africa.

In 1904 I attended Stanley Barracks in Toronto and qualified as a lieutenant. Then in 1906 I went to Woodley Barracks in London and got my captain's papers. I continued with the regiment until 1912 or 1913 when I resigned my commission. However, I again got into uniform in the First World War, going overseas with the Canadian Army Service Corps.

"As the Lorne Rifles didn't participate in the fall review in 1901 for the then Duke of Cornwall in Toronto, I joined the 36th Peel (Red Coats) We were quartered in the Exhibition grounds. Capt Hamilton of Port Credit was in charge of our Company.

"In 1908 when the Prince of Wales (later George VI) and Lord Roberts were over for a celebration in Quebec City, I served with a Composite company of Infantry. The review was held on the Plains of Abraham.

"At your get-together in October it is doubtful if many of the old soldiers of 1901 or Canadian Boer War Veterans will be present. I am passing this on for what it is worth.

Maple Baptists Have Record Church School

One hundred and ninety-two Sunday School scholars set a new record for Maple Avenue Baptist Church on the opening day of the fall term. Sunday school lessons ranged from Joseph to the Gospel of John in the graded-to-age bible study lessons. All departments showed increases over the previous months and a back to normal atmosphere pervaded the whole church.

Four departments make up the Sunday School at Maple Avenue Baptist Church. They are the nursery department, ages 3 to 6, the beginner dept. ages 4 to 6, the primary/junior dept. ages 7 to 11, and the senior dept. which includes both young people and adults. A nursery is provided for adults who want to attend the adult bible class and have small children.

Sunday school superintendent Mr. William Ganton expressed his hope that the Sunday school would set a new record this year, surpassing the old record of 233.

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
