Harrowing Experience For Local Bank Teller

A Georgetown woman, Mrs. Catherine Hayes, 24, who works as a teller in a branch of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce in Toronto had a rather irregular withdrawal slip thrust at her last week. Mrs. Hayes was at her wicket at the bank at the corner of Eglinton West and Glenagden Ave. when a man entered the bank, scribbled a message on the back of a deposit slip and pushed it across the counter. The message said "Do not scream or alarm. I mean business."

Mrs. Hayes responded to the threat with \$1,500 in loose bills which he dropped into an inside pocket.

The well-dressed man, who wore a neat blue suit and carried an automatic in his brief case, carefully used his palm, and avoided leaving his fingerprints on the bank door when he bumped into 10-year-old Michael Persin as he rushed out. Police are unable to classify palm prints and therefore cannot trace the man if he has a record.

The brief case and gun were later discovered hidden in a flower bed on Wembley Road. Inspector Arthur Walmer said the gun, a 38-calibre revolver, had a broken spring and was empty.
