MYLES GILSON AND DAUGHTER LAVERNE listen to the wonder of the turn-of-the-century, the United Talking Machine, which occupies a special place in the Gilson home in respect for its age, if for no other reason. The machine, operated by a hand crank was the forerunner of the modern record player, and has entertained four generations of the Gilson family with its inimitable scratchy voice. Manufactured by the United Talking Machine Co. of Chicago the machine plays heavy plate type records with 1 1/2" diameter holes. Among the few such records still surviving in the Gilson collection are: (get these titles) The Ghost of the Violin; Another Rag-A Raggy Rag; Sunshine and Rose; How Could I Know; Sing Me the Rosary; Just a Dream of You Dear; Mammy's Fireside; and (of all things) If Your Wife Wants to Go to the Country Let Her Go.

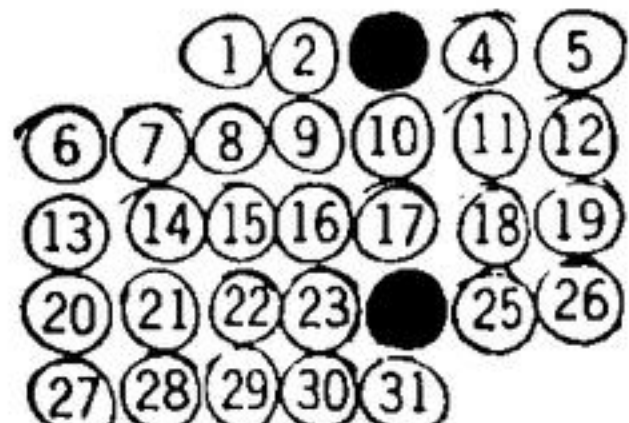
Mr. David Roughley has enrolled at Ryerson last year, and Miss Gail Colmore is taking a business course in Brampton.

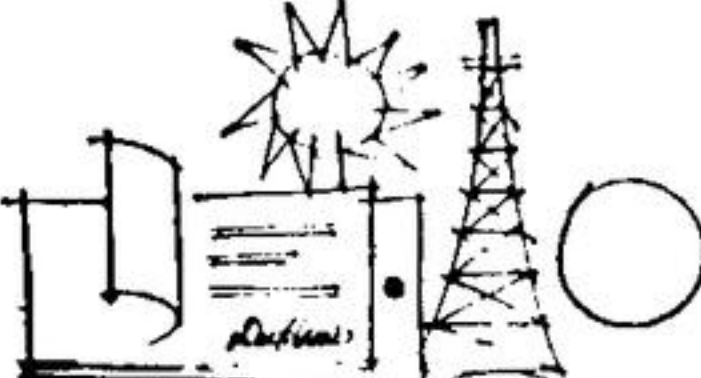

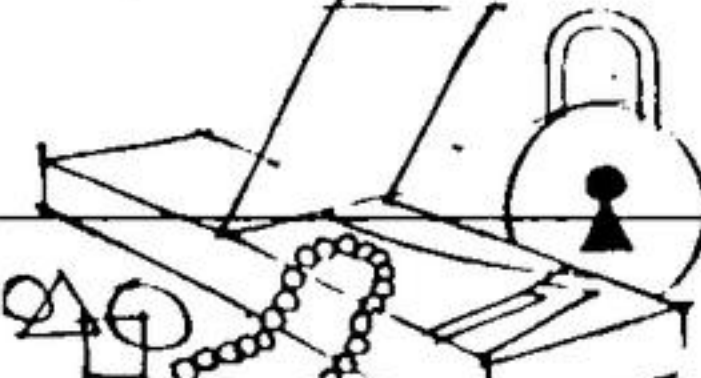
