**Favours Ward 3 Only? Not So—Hildebrandt**

"Favour Ward 3 only? Not so," said Cr Chas. Hildebrandt in a road work discussion at the Sept. 17th council meeting. The councillor was criticizing a plan to help overcome a 1962 town deficit by under spending this year's road budget. He cited \$36 in sidewalk repairs in his area as one needed item and said a balanced budget means nothing if such things have to be deferred.

Cr Hildebrandt was sharply rapped by Mayor Hyde as "thinking in a ward."

"I was elected from a ward and this would be meaningless if I didn't care for the interests of those who voted for me," he said "but this doesn't mean I don't consider the town as a whole, too."

Road chairman Hunter said he intends to stay within his budget and that sidewalk repairs should be brought to committee meetings for discussion rather than in open council.

**Big Exhibit Planned by County For World Plowing Match**

Plans are moving ahead rapidly for a Halton County exhibit at the World Plowing Match to be held in Caledon, Oct. 8-11.

Present plans call for a photomontage with the shape of the geographical boundaries of a large bell tent with a cedar entrance way lined with sam-

work of the Children's Aid Society in the county, and a large operational model of the Kelso Dam, sponsored by the Conservation Authority. This model will be the focal point of the exhibit.

The Industrial Display committee of county council dropped as too expensive original plans calling for a model of the new County Administration Building as the focal point. This will be sponsored by the Halton County Emergency Measures Organization.

A co-operative model of energy resources in the county is planned with the manager of United Gas Co in Georgetown, Alex Blackwell, supervising the project and working in conjunction with representatives from the other fuel companies.

Walls of the tent will be covered with what the committee describes as an "eye-catching" photographic layout depicting the many facets of Halton life, rural and urban, farm and factory.

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**QUINTS SADDEN HALTON WOMAN**

Mrs. Yvonne Davis leafed sadly through a diary of three years spent with the Dionne quintuplets and said she was saddened at the bitterness of a recent attack on their parents by the four surviving quints.

Mrs. Davis, who lives at Beattie, cared for the children in their impoverished Cornhill home from the day they were born until she left, heart broken at parting from them, just before their third birthday.

The four children's attack on their parents is contained in an article in McCall's Magazine. They called their home "the saddest we have ever seen."

Their childhood was ridden with a sense of guilt, they said. Their parents acted "as though they had been partners in some unspoken crime by bringing us into the world."

Mrs. Davis said the father, Oliva Dionne, resented having nurses and doctors looking after the babies in a nursery built by the government near the farm house where they were born.

"Such bitterness. It is all so long ago. I am sorry for the whole bunch of them," Mrs. Davis said.

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
