

## Board Meets Their Waterloo Delegation Airls 22 Beefs

At 2:30 in the morning, Esqueing School Board adjourned early Wednesday, with only a decision to meet again Friday to show for the long, bitter dispute with a delegation from the old Waterloo school area.

The main grievance of the group was the moving of their 12 children from a new graded school at Speyside, to an old ungraded school at Milton Heights, "without any notice whatsoever."

"An act of injustice and discrimination," were the words of Mrs. Gordon Fisher in describing the Board's action. She emphasized the unity and solidarity of the group in preparing a list of 22 grievances.

Illustrating the general feeling of being deliberately discriminated against, were remarks such as "our children were hand picked. There are homes scattered among us where the children go to Pineview and Speyside." Another sample of this attitude was the comment: "We have been a vocal group in the past, and we feel this is the reason our children were chosen."

The first objection in the long list was the fact the children were loaded into buses on the first day of school and neither they or their parents told where they were going. In fact some of the parents said they did not know till after five in the evening where the children had been all day. This, the group claimed, was in direct contradiction to an advertisement in the paper which said all parents would be notified personally if children had to be moved. In reply, Trustee W. Lawson said he assumed the principals had done this. "Until opening day," he continued, "we did not know there would be so much overcrowding, so I couldn't possibly telephone all the parents."

How and when the decision was made seemed of major importance to the parents. They claimed the decision was made Aug. 28th, leaving over a week before school opening, with no notification. The Board contended only the general decision to make the move was decided Aug. 26, but no names of pupils mentioned. It was decided on the Grade vacancies along existing bus lines, said the Board. "Is it not usual to take children from areas nearest the school," queried Mrs. Robertson. "There are children much closer to Milton Heights than ours, being bussed back to Pineview," she contended.

Again the feeling of being discriminated against, was evidenced when another point suggested that the principal and vice principal at Speyside School had been primed to have the list ready with the particular names on it. Trustee W. Lawson denied this, claiming that the only advance knowledge the principals had of the meeting was that it involved transportation, and the Speyside principal had only been contacted late the night before the meeting. "Again a voice called out — 'were there no children on Highway 25, closer to Milton Heights in the same grades as ours?'"

"It's hard to explain," confessed Board Chairman R. Cunningham.

**Town Will Finish Subdivision Roads**

Their patience exhausted with little or no action on the roads through the Lane subdivision, Council Monday night decided to contact the bonding company and tell them the town will start the work on Wednesday with the costs coming out of the bond. The bonding company will be given the alternative of hiring a contractor but work must be started immediately. The discussion was sparked by a complaint from Dennis Scallen of 62 Windsor Road, who told of mounds of gravel in the middle of the road, creating clouds of dust with every car.

The mayor explained to Mr. Scallen that in order to receive a subsidy of 50% from the Dept. of Highways, the roads have to be brought up to their specifications before the town takes them over.

**Wins Four Ribbons At Acton Fair**

Pamela Clark, 41 Main St. S. brought home 4 ribbons in the jumping classes with her horse "Pam's Playboy," at Acton Fair.
