GVAS Fear St. John To Cut Numbers

Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service is concerned that the advent of a St. John Ambulance unit in town might have adverse effects on the GVAS.

Saying he was spokesman for the service, Harrison Wood told council on Monday that there is no place in town for the two groups. He stressed that he was not criticizing the St. John organization, which he feels does excellent work.

Mr. Wood's concern is that the two groups appeal to the same men. GVAS has a problem in maintaining capacity membership and he feels council should also be concerned because there is a \$50,000 investment in ambulance equipment. Industry has cooperated in all having members to answer calls, too and he thinks two groups might run into trouble in this.

"I think the Act-a group which is sponsoring this should have contacted GVAS first," said Mr. Wood. "We are trying to arrange a meeting to discuss it with them."
