



SHIPMENT FROM LIMEHOUSE FIRST OVER ROUTE

THE FIRST FREIGHT TRAIN has rolled over the western leg of the newly-laid access line into the Canadian National Railway's Toronto Yard, still under construction. It marked the first time that the CN's new Humber bridge was crossed, too. The train was made up of two diesels, 40 cars carrying ballast, and a caboose, work load of 3,300 tons. The shipment originated from quarries at Limehouse, just west of the Georgetown yard. Engineer was Reginald MacNamara, conductor was George Borford, both of Stratford. Construction of the Terminal Project was begun in the spring of 1961, and will be physically complete next year, operational in 1965.

Limehouse School Completion Discussed with Architects

Esquousing school board members, architect Ed Barnett and his supervisor Keg Cameron on Tuesday evening discussed the final stages of completing details on the Limehouse school. Members queried some accounts to Lostracco Construction, contractors for the school.

Mr. Barnett substantiated certain amounts and told the board Mr. Lostracco was willing to have the entire job completed as soon as possible in order to have final payments completed.

Principal Robert Gibbons from the Stewarttown School and Garry Dawkins from Speake school representing teachers in the Esquousing school area requested a change in teachers' monthly payment system.

Budget Problem?

Mr. Gibbons stated the present system was a burden to some teachers who had commitments to meet and suggested the board make the first salary payment the first week of September and the next payment before the end of the month. New Fire Chief For Chinguacousy
