No. 7 Defence Platoon for 7th Canadian Infantry Brigade was authorized 7th April, 1941. The platoon was mobilized from Lorne Scots personnel at Standard Barracks, Hamilton, under Lt. B. F. Bunt with a strength of 1 officer, 1 CSM, 1 Sgt., 4 Cpls., 2 L. Cpls., 37 privates. The platoon proceeded overseas on Sept. 13th, arriving at Aldershot on 9th Sept. Lt. F. Tilston, 1st Brigade Defence Platoon, was assumed command on 17th Dec. 1941. The platoon continued training with 7th Inf Bde until 10th May, 1943, when the platoon was disbanded and the personnel drafted to the Canadian Highlanders of Canada. The seventh Infantry Brigade Ground Defence Platoon embarked on June 4th and waded ashore on Mike Green Beach at 1515 hours, June 6th, 1943. The 7th Canadian Infantry Brigade was the only British unit to reach its objective on the 8th line on Jan. 10, 1945, for a 3 week period. On March 16th the heavy fighting at Caen and the border into Holland. The platoon crossed the Rhine on 24th March, advancing through Reichswald Forest, vision over the Rhine and into Germany, when the Armistice was signed. The platoon was disbanded 30th October, 1945.

No. 8 defence platoon for the 8th Canadian Infantry Brigade was organized 7th April, 1941, at Standard Barracks, Hamilton from Lorne Scots personnel. Lt. J. It embarked on the SS John Sweet 3rd on July 1941, disembarked 7th July 1941, and took over defence positions around the headquarters in the area of Brazenville on 7th July. On 12th there were three casualties from shell fire. Following closely on the heels of the leading infantry, the platoon crossed the Seine Sept. 1 and took part in the memoir Falaise on Aug. 14. On Aug. 17, the United States Air Force strafed the Bde area, but there were no casualties in the platoon. They crossed the Somme River near Cambrai on Sept. 14 and moved forward to the vicinity of Ghent by 1st November. The brigade took part in operation Veritable and was in vicinity of Albergen, Germany, when cease fire sounded May 4th. The platoon was disbanded 31st Oct. 1945.

Lt. N. S. Low in command with 35th Canadian Infantry Brigade, NCO's and 13 privates and assumed the duties of headquarters guards. The brigade took part in the attack on the Hitler Line on 23 May, 1944. The reconnaissance party of the platoon captured 23 Germans on 3 Sept. in Cattolica. The platoon embarked on 11 Mar. on L.S.T. at Lezhorn for Marsigliés, France, arriving at concentration area, Herenthals, Belgium, on 19th March. The platoon crossed the Rhine on 7th April and was in the vicinity of Oldenburg when news of the capitulation of German forces in Holland, Denmark and North Germany was received on May 4th, 1945, and was disbanded 11th Aug., 1945.

The third Canadian Infantry Brigade Defence Platoon was authorized 6th Feb. 1941, and disembarked 16 May, 1943. It was re-authorized 24th Feb. 1944, in the area near Ortona by the 3rd Canadian Infantry Brigade support group, under the Lorne Scots. The unit was authorized 6th Feb. 1941, Lt. J. Norris was commanding at the time of Dieppe, Aug. 18, 1942. He and 13 OR's embarked on a Landing Ship Tank at approximately 2000 hours and touched down on white beach at 1605 hours on the 19th under heavy fire. Lt. Norris was wounded. Seven personnel and the broader waded to shore and the L.S.T. pulled out under fire. CSM Irvine, CPL Brown, Pte. Dalson, Rosemeyer and Seed were reported missing. The platoon was disbanded 20th May 1942. The 6th Infantry Brigade ground defence platoon Lorne Scots was re-organized 24th Feb. 1944.
