Under a cloak of secrecy the Beavers held their first practice and coach Del Beaumont didn't waste a second in letting 22 try-outs know that if they lacked the legs and wind they wouldn't be pushing a puck for his club come opening game time. Beaumont, who guided the Georgetown Midgets to the Ontario title last year with his "Skate-skate" tactics, made it tough for the hopeful who let their condition slide during the off-season. For almost an hour the collection of graduated Georgetown Midgets, Juveniles and outside assistance went about the business of waking a couple of hundred dormant muscles. Beaumont had his charges on one side of the ice surface to the other until their knees turned to rubber. And when it looked like they could not place one blade in front of the other he sent them one way and then the other around the rink at full throttle. A short breather in the dressing room split the practice and allowed Beaumont a chance to lay it on the line for his crew while they were too busy inhaling great chunks of air to ask questions. It also allowed manager Red Asseltine a chance to greet the rookies and introduce trainers Jim James and Bud Gibbs. Beaumont split the group into two squads, had one team don orange track shirts over their sweaters and the other team green, and let them scrimmage for the better part of an hour. He could better see what he had to build a team from. To cap the workout Beaumont held a brief shooting session and then hustled them all to the showers.

Halton Regulations For Hunting Season

In issuing the dates for hunting seasons on Halton's wild life, Game Warden R. M. Reid reminds hunters that no red head or canvasback ducks are to be shot. 'They're getting scarce,' he stated. He said the same restriction was in effect last year. Another bird that may be included on the protection list is the wood duck. Only two of these birds may be shot per hunter, the game warden said. Season on duck geese and partridge begins Oct. 5th and lasts until Dec. 14. No more than five of each bird can be shot in one day. A person can have no more than 10 ducks or geese in his possession and no more than 15 partridges. The pheasant season lasts from Oct. 16 to Nov. 2. Hunters are limited to three per day, one of which can be a hen. The rabbit season begins the same day as the one in previous years. It lasts for a longer period however until Feb. 29, 1964. These restrictions and time limits apply to all of Southern Ontario.
