Briefs Invited on the Subject of the Proposed MEDICAL SERVICES INSURANCE. The Government of Ontario has appointed an Enquiry which: 1. Having regard to the maintenance of the physical and material well-being of the people of Ontario, and the social, economic and health benefits to be achieved through the establishment and operation of a feasible medical services insurance programme, shall: Examine and enquire into, hold meetings for the study and discussion of, receive representations in connection with matters related to, and consistent with, the basic principles, purposes and objectives of Bill 163 of the 1962-63 session of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario respecting Medical Services Insurance. 2. After due study and consideration, to make recommendations and report upon matters enquired into under the terms set out herein as the commissioners see fit to the Prime Minister and Executive Council of Ontario. Colourful Military Ceremony Set for World Plowing Match

His Honor W. Earl Rowe, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, will present new Colors to the Lorne Scots Regiment on behalf of Her Majesty the Queen at 2 p.m. on Saturday, October 12, at Caledon Farms, Caledon, the home of the Unit's Honorary Lieutenant-Col. Conn Smythe, MC. The colorful ceremony will be the highlight of the closing day of the Ontario, Canadian and World Plowing Matches.

The Regiment takes particular pride in having its Colors presented by Hon. Earl Rowe, who for so many years represented Dufferin County in the Legislature and House of Commons, and has long been an honorary member of the Lorne Scots Officers Mess. His membership, in fact, dates back to the days of the Peel and Dufferin Regiment, one of the Units which in 1936 was amalgamated with the Halton Rifles to form the Lorne Scots. One of the Regiment's five Companies is located at Georgetown.

Easily the largest and one of the most spectacular military parades in Canadian post-war military history, the event will feature in full Scottish dress the march past of more than 350 "kilties". The Caledon Hills will echo to stirring martial music played by the massed pipes and drums and military band.

Colors have been in use for centuries and were the result of two practical requirements: the need of some mark of distinction between families and a conspicuous rallying point in battle. To the Lornes on October 12, will be presented two Colors, the Queen's Color and the Regimental Color, upon which are emblazoned the names of the battles in which the Unit has distinguished itself. The countries' militiamen have seen active service from the days of Brock at Queen's Heights to the final surrender of the Axis in 1945.

The deep significance of these Colors will be emphasized by their consecration by the Director of Chaplain Services, (P) Canadian Army, Col. J. R. Miller, CD, assisted by the Right Rev. F. H. Wilkinson, MM, Bishop of Toronto, and the Regimental Chaplain, Rev. Arthur MacLellan, rector of St. James' Anglican Church in Brampton.
