

Throw Store By-Law Out? Council Majority Says No

Store closing hours in Georgetown still retain the status quo. One of the local papers... While three councillors on Monday favoured throwing the by-law out entirely, a majority felt this measure would not please neither the merchant group which wants Thursday evenings open nor the group which wants the present by-law maintained. The Smith-Hildebrandt faction was supported by Cr Emmerson. County Council Briefs

The cost of borrowing money was shown clearly when an issue of \$658,000 of debentures for the Oakville Trafalgar hospital was sold to Nesbitt, Thomson, & Co. at Halton County Council last week. On the schedule attached to the by-law it showed that during the 20 year life of the debenture the County will pay \$465,635 in interest, plus principal of \$658,000 for a total of \$1,123,635. "Why should a committee tell the Warden where he'll have his dinner, or who'll be at it?" demanded Reeve G. Leslie of Esquesing. He advocated a return to the old system whereby the Warden was allowed so much for the yearly dinner, then left alone to organize it. Smiling, Warden Martin replied: "If you want a change it will have to be next year. It has been set up this way for...
