Coun. Charles Hildebrandt felt a purchasing agent for the town would be an asset, but Council didn't buy it Monday night.
He advocated that a purchasing agent be chosen from the present office staff to do all the buying, resulting in the town saving nothing of this, said the mayor, "and it requires careful study."
Reeve Elliott favoured the idea, citing the County system as an example. Council was too small to be necessary, he said. "I don't have a qualified purchasing staff," he added.
On a recorded vote the motion was lost, with the majority feeling that the idea had merit, but should be discussed in Committee first. Only Coun. Young and Hildebrandt and Reeve Elliott favoured the motion.
