# Neighbours Confine Fire To Tool Shed, Save House

Residents of the Town Line came to the aid of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Collins when a neighbour boy noticed the Collins' tool shed on fire about noon in Sunday, Oct. 6th. The shed was about 30 feet from the back of the house. Mr. and Mrs. Collins were away from home as they had left about 10:30 to visit some friends in Galt, whom they had met on a trip to the British Isles last year.

They have no idea what could have caused the fire, as they had not been in the shed before leaving and it was not wired for electricity.

On the discovery of the blaze a neighbour phoned for the fire truck and others concentrated on saving the house. With the aid of a couple of hoses that Mr. Collins used for watering his market gardening produce and water from their well, they drenched the back of the house. Mr. Alex Kudras and his son and an unidentified man who happened to be passing in a black car at the time, got up on the wooden shingle roof with the hoses and kept it from catching fire until the fire truck arrived.

The tool shed and contents were a complete loss. All their tools including a couple of power lawn mowers were destroyed in the blaze. The loss is estimated at about \$500. Mrs. Joe Murray was anxious about the number of strangers around the place following the fire and phoned Mr. Collins daughter, Mrs. Doug Arnold of Springbrook. They came right over and stayed.

They had quite a time loca- ting Mr. and Mrs. Collins as they were not sure of the nam- es of their friends in Galt, but with the help of Mr. Claude McLaughlin who had been taken to the Farmers' Tour Trip and knew their friends, they were able to phone to Mr. and Mrs. Collins and tell them of their rescue. They also changed their meeting night from the first Wednesday in the month to the first Tuesday in the month.
