LEGION NOTES

Medals Swayed to Parade Music As 500 March on 'Colours Day'

Medals swayed to the rhythm of marching feet last Saturday as Legion members from Peel, Dufferin and Halton Counties donned their ribbons and berets to parade with the Lorne Scots at their Presentation of Colours Ceremony.

The wail of pipes and roll of drums resounded through the Caledon hills as over 350 "kilties" and 150 "Legionnaires" played their parts in the majestic parade which was held at the Caledon farms of Hon. Lt. Col. Conn Smythe following the International Plowing Match.

The Regimental and Queen's Colours, which were presented by the Hon. W. Earl Rowe, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, to the Queen, incorporate the battle honours credited to the regiment following World War II.

The inspecting party, composed of Hon. W. Earl Rowe, Hon. Colonel J. R. Barber, ED, CD and Hon. Lt. Col. Conn Smythe, inspected the Legion veterans and the Lorne Scots following which the Legionnaires marched past the reviewing stand to "Old Comrades" played by the Brass and Reed Band. They then retired to the side lines to leave to the Lorne Scots a day that was truly their own.

On inspection the Legionnaires, though slightly more greying of hair and rounder of midriff than the picture they presented twenty some years ago when, under more dire circumstances, they presented themselves for inspection, were certainly not lacking in the squared shoulders and proud demeanour that has helped make our side the winning side. A firm round of applause from the spectators indicated that the pride they felt in their stride was reflected in their stride as they marched past the reviewing stand.

Although the regiment is a local one, veterans from British Columbia on the west to Nova Scotia on the east and south to Massachusetts were present. In addition to distance, considerable time was encompassed by veterans of two world wars and at least one Boer War veteran, in the person of Capt. Russell M. Cle-

ments, of Milton, who joined the Lorne Rifles in 1901.

Members of Branch 120 were proud to be a part of this colourful pageant which, for the Lorne Scots, has brought up to date their over 165 year history. We congratulate the regiment on receipt of their new colours.
