Mr. J. Knott of Cooksville, who has appeared before, again sought permission, saying he would put in roads, sewers and water systems. He claimed the township would receive ten dollars per month per unit.

Councillor G. Currie replied: "\$120 a year would educate a child."

"Let's face the school question," retorted Mr. Knott. "You only pay a third of the cost of educating a child, the other governments pay the rest, and soon the province will take it all over. You have to standardize education."

Continuing Mr. Knott stated: "I manufacture and sell trailers. I'm prepared to put up a factory to build them all we need is somebody interested enough to see what we want to do."

Last time you were here," asked Coun. R. Lawson, "didn't you say you would bring us a copy of the agreement you made with Fort Erie to let you establish a trailer camp?"
