Nigeria is a country with a 40 million population has half a million blind. Muhammad Bello said causes for blindness in his country are ignorance, lack of sanitation facilities and a number of different viruses. Small children often go blind as the result of smallpox and measles he stated. His government cannot afford to build special schools for them with the result blind children are sent to ordinary schools. This has proven satisfactory, Mr. Bello said. The government is attempting to educate the public.
