Plans are to completely modernize the farm and establish a feedlot area which will figure said.

"We intend to prevent any disease spreading on this farm by taking strict measures," he said.

Company president, Les McAllister said that work is already under way to convert a main barn into a big cattle weekly community auction site loading and unloading shed. It would be the only one held in new 100 ft. barns a \$50,000 building. The "first" is to be held on Oct. 26th and new office scheduled for Oct. 22nd.

Sticks talking over the farm, the company has already made a shipment of 100 head of cattle to Mexico. A second shipment of young bulls is now being prepared for a destination in England.

At present three cattle buyers are employed but as the operation develops more will be taken on. The farm will be kept in pasture with a capacity for 400 head.
