Having read and written so much about the opening day (the works at the marsh, I was just a little bit disappointed I had expected to be able to show my hunting skill while nimbly dodging the pellets that would no doubt be flying every which way.

I did however, take the opportunity to examine some of the complaints being circulated by hunters. Some of these involve duck hunting in particular. One complaint wanted the introduction of regulated duck hunting. This is not the same as regulated pheasant hunting as we know it. It would only be introduced in areas such as Luther Marsh, this Marsh, Conks Bay etc.

As it stands now, many hunters visit Luther Marsh, but few encounter good hunting. In a regulated area fewer hunters are entertained but more many more would find excellent hunting. Think for a minute can you imagine what our Provincial Parks would be like if they opened the doors and allowed anyone and everyone to camp where they please. The one complaint against regulated areas is that many hunters would be left with no where to hunt. The regulated areas presented this same problem.

As the years go by, not just population increases in the area but a percentage of the hunters and because of this increase in hunting pressure, accidents are also on the increase. The Hunter Safety Course was introduced to deal with these accidents. But are we getting the full benefit from these courses when after passing, this course, we can't shoot in any direction for fear of hitting another hunter.

As the hunting accidents increase, the need for more like a regulated area that will soon be regulated pheasant hunting areas and only heard in 20 years ago. It would only be introduced in areas such as Luther Marsh, this Marsh, Conks Bay etc.

To get back to the opening day at Luther Marsh, I had a great time and my friends and I were entertained. Our fears were unwarranted. These earlier hunters were gentlemen. They waited until we arrived then, invited us on all four sides. To top it off, marksmen as very few ducks got through their barrage of shots. At one time they appeared on all sides and except for an overhead shot, all hunters were left with no where to hunt. The regulated areas presented this same problem.
