Disagrees with Expenditure For New Municipal Building

The most recent breach of trust carried out by some members of council, in order to be comfortable and dignified, is the purchase of the old Post Office and the sale of the present Municipal Buildings. How much road surface could be covered and how many culverts and storm sewers would \$65,000 repair or install on our street.
