Members of the Kinsmen Club of Georgetown will attend the District One Fall Council Meeting being held in Chatham on this Friday and Saturday. Local delegates to the meeting are President Jack Findlay, Vice-Pres. Trev Moore and Past Pres. Harry Levy.
The Fall Council Meeting is a gathering of all Club Presidents of the District, together with the District Executive headed by Governor Hal Taggart of London. The Governor and his executive committee will lay before the delegates plans for the operation of Kinsmen affairs in this area over the next Club year.
A member of the National Executive of the Association of Kinsmen Clubs will also be on hand to explain the overall policies adopted for the all Canadian organization at its recent National Convention.
The District One meeting will enable Kinsmen from Southwestern Ontario to exchange service ideas to learn more about parliamentary procedure and hear for charity Clubs raise funds for charity. Two of the Kinsmen Clubs activities are to train their members in modern business and professional methods and ethics and to carry on service work in their communities. Also delayed was a by-law to fix the fees paid to County Council members. The proposed fee is twenty dollars a meeting including committee work. This is the same as the present amount. They too receive the same expense allowances as the Warden.
