Grass Fires Tax Firemen As Dry Spell Continues

Concerned with the number of calls to grass fires during an unseasonable dry spell, fire department and municipal officials this week issued an appeal for caution.

In an announcement authorized by the town council in this issue of the Herald, Mayor Hyde asked residents not to drop live cigarette butts or to rake dead grass away from buildings.

Volunteer firemen, he told council Monday, have been taxed to the limit fighting stubborn grass fires, and this places a burden on industry which cooperates in allowing time off for members of the fire department.

An indication of the size of the sudden fire problem is the length of the list of calls for fire fighting assistance within the past 7 days.

Last Thursday a car fire on Main St. North required the brigade shortly after 5 o'clock. Later the same day a load of garbage was dumped in the Armstrong Ave area and ignited dry grass.

Friday afternoon a bush fire on the 8th line south of town cleared fifteen acres before firemen were summoned.

A burning rubbish pile got away from the burner on Saturday noon and ran wild momentarily. That was in the

Wildwood area at the north end of Main St.

Shortly after, Wilfrid Leslie Jr. called the department for assistance when brush on his property north of the Terrace Cottages flared up.

Later Georgetown trucks rushed to the borderline between Milton and Georgetown fire territories when it appeared a raging grass fire being battled by Milton was about to cross the line it didn't.

The next call was to summon firemen back to the stubborn blaze on the 8th line below town.

At the bottom of Charles St. a bush fire, next on the list, kept the smoke eaters busy for close to five hours.

Saturday night fire was discovered sweeping through a dry field and bush near the old Lamehouse school, and the brigade was on the road again. Coincidentally this one happened while Fire Chief Bob Bondfield was on his way to Milton to discuss fire problems with county fire chiefs there.

Sunday, it was a third call to the 8th line grass and trees blaze that was still smouldering underground and breaking out at remote points. In all the brigade spent a total of 25 hours at this one.

The last one before a lull in time occurred Tuesday night when grass and bush on the Heslop property were blackened by flames discovered shortly after 7 p.m.
