She was an active worker in Runnymede Presbyterian Church. She was also a member of the Runnymede lawn bowling club.

Her husband, who was a pattern maker for the city of Toronto and pipe major of the Earlescourt Band, died in 1931. She was also predeceased by a brother William Stalker in 1958. She leaves two sisters, Mrs. Hazen Graham, R.R. 2, Georgetown, and Miss Ann Stalker, Acton.

Rev. Earl Smith conducted the funeral service in Toronto on October 7th. COUNTY COUNCIL BRIEFS

A contract was awarded to McHaffie Birze Construction Co. for the reconstruction of a part of the Seventh Line from Drummond north about a mile. This has been the scene of recent fatal accidents. The contract was for \$71,697.

The Department of Highways are preparing a draft by-law to absorb the road from Milton Heights to the Kelso Conservation Area into the County Road System.

At the suggestion of Weed Inspector V. McArthur, County Council approved the holding of a Weed Poster Contest in all the elementary schools in the county. The Weed Inspector told the Committee he had encountered difficulty in arranging the contest in the Oakville Schools.

County Council set the rent for the Health Unit quarters at \$675 per month, including heat, light and janitor services and the rent for the Children's Aid Society at \$4,000 per year. They were informed that the Board of Health now has 23 nurses on the staff.

Bills totalling \$93,164.77 were approved for payment.

Buchanan House Sol Paintings are Popular

Approximately 170 people viewed the one man exhibition of Paul Buchanan's paintings at House Sol over Saturday and Sunday, a crowd only second in size to the Yosef Drenters show.

This show should endear itself to the many who deplore abstract art. There is nothing of the abstract in this show. Mr. Buchanan is a realistic painter. His portraits are traditional or in other words, they look like the people he is painting.

His religious art is stylized and his Mother and Child which is realistic is completely different from anything in that field. This painting was bought by another artist Josef Drenters who himself has quite a name in the field of religious art. One of Paul Buchanan's sketches is of Yosef.

This artist has developed a high degree of technical skill and what might be called plain old fashioned drawing ability. He was commissioned by the Canadian Save the Children Fund, to do a painting from which their Christmas cards this year have been made. The original hangs in House Sol right now.

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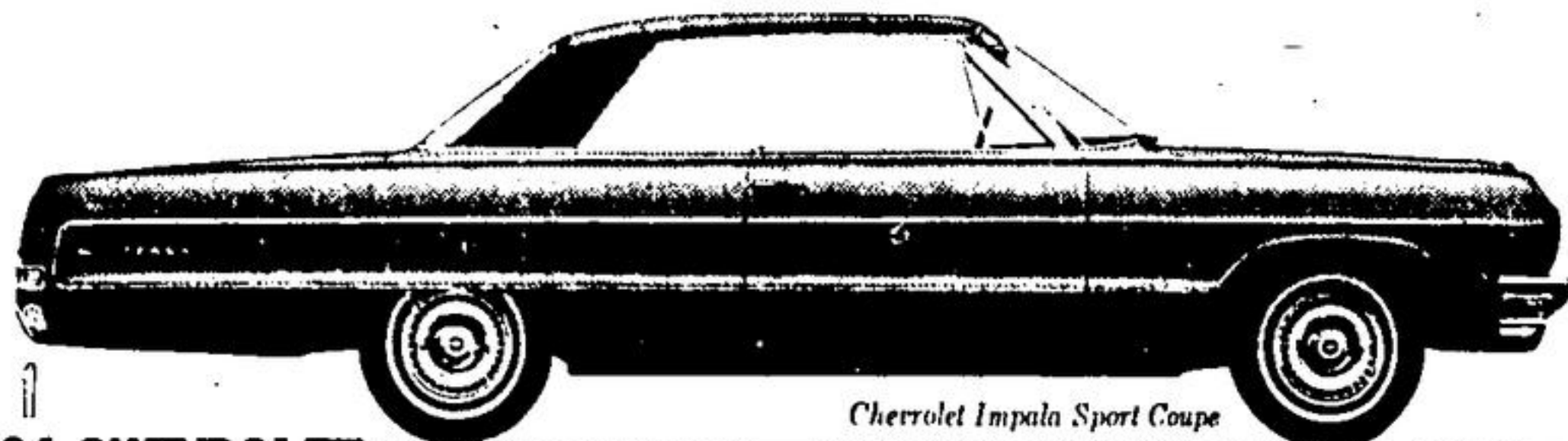
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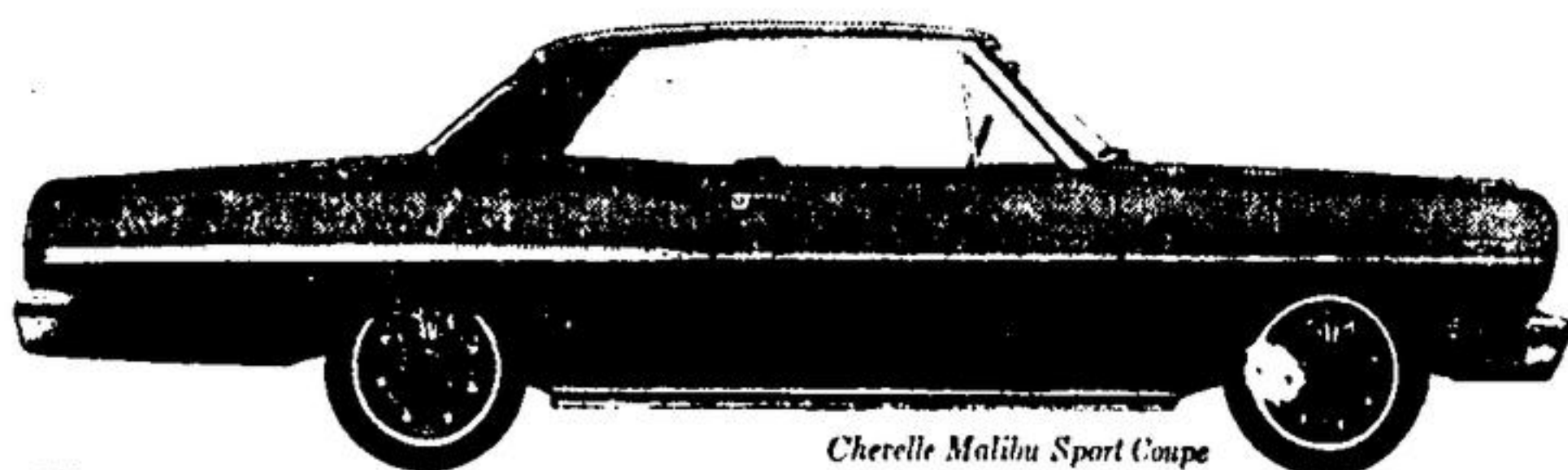
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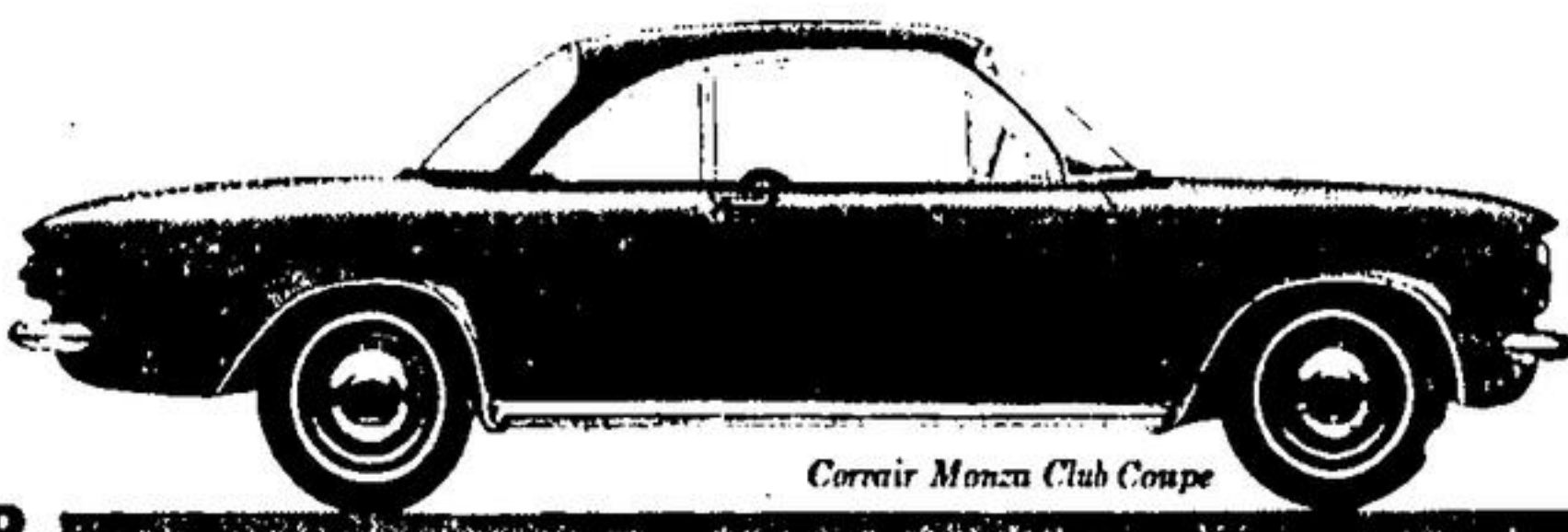

Halton Conservation Committee Dissolved

Dissolution of the Halton Conservation Committee was approved by Halton County at a meeting last week.

The Halton Agriculture and Reforestation Committee will continue the land use and farm pond policy as it is at present.

Discussion had been held earlier on the possibility of Conservation Authorities handling the farm pond and land use assistance.

In the report, it was revealed that the County has 1365 acres under reforestation, which they will continue to control under agreement with the Department of Lands and Forests.
