

Renewed Feud with Tanners, and Milton, Means Guaranteed Crowds

Georgetown Raiders, who two short weeks ago were apparently gasping their last, are suddenly a very healthy aggregation and a Sunday night hypothesis has practically guaranteed their future soundness.

At a Western Ontario Athletic Association meeting in Acton Sunday, Raiders application for entry into the compact district league was accepted which automatically created one of the happiest hockey situations in the province.

The Raider acceptance means a rekindling of the old feuds that used to tax the arena's seating capacity in the pre-war days. The major factor of course is that Georgetown Raiders will be pitted against arch enemies Acton Tanners several times in a renaissance of the Mesogage, Capulet relationship that has laid dormant since the early 1940s.

Another fire rekindled will be the Georgetown - Milton rivalry, the ice war that almost made local hockey goers forget the Acton skirmishes up until two years ago when Milton dropped out of the OHA picture.

The balance of the league lineup reads like a list of best drawing cards here: Ferguson, Orangeville, Elora and Cheltenham - district teams with double benefit to Raiders - district teams, and consequently bigger draws, and less traveling expense.

Ironically, it will be a former Raider coaching the Acton Tanners this season in Junior B, as many pre-season tilts for the newly formed Georgetown club. It was also their best performance to date.
