

# Eagle Signals-New Town Industry Gives Hint of Probable Expansion

## Introduce Executives At Dinner by Jaycees

A substantial building to house heavy rolling mill equipment is in the offing for Georgetown's newest industry, company president Carl Anderson told attendees at a dinner at North Halton Golf & Country Club last Wednesday.

The dinner was planned by the Junior Chamber of Commerce to introduce executives of Eagle Signals, a division of the E. W. Bliss Co., to other local industrialists and civic leaders.

Mr. Anderson and Ed Shuster, vice president of international operations, arrived by plane from New York City where they had attended a director's meeting earlier that day. Also with the visitors were George Chandler, Toronto, sales manager; E. R. Malthouse, vice president and division manager of Eagle Signals; H. G. Shuckler, corporate secretary; C. E. Davis, of Toronto's Davis Controls Corporation which acts as a sales agent for Bliss products and H. Wesley Cowan, manager of the new Georgetown plant.

Mr. Anderson who was introduced by Deputy Reeve Wm F. Hunter, said that none of the firm's products are beyond the capacity of the Georgetown plant which commenced operations a few months ago in the former Sykes Tool building beside Standard Products on the highway.

The Bliss company is international in scope, comprising factories in several American cities, with associate companies in Canada, Paris, Japan, Derby, England, Germany, Israel and Australia. Yearly sales are \$125,000,000 in timers and traffic controls, heavy machinery, aircraft equipment, jet engine parts, missile and submarine equipment.

"We must find a substantial building by 1964 within a radius of fifty miles," Mr. Anderson told his audience "for heavy machinery and rolling mill equipment for our manufacturing needs."

He introduced Mr. Shuster and Mr. Malthouse, who complimented Deputy Reeve Hunter and Mayor Hyde for their assistance in helping the firm locate in Georgetown.

"Mr. Hunter is a good salesman," said Mr. Shuster.

"There was no high pressure when he showed us the property," added Mr. Malthouse. "And the mayor was also exceptionally helpful in the negotiations."

Mr. Shuster indicated that a major reason for the Georgetown location was that his firm was impressed with the vocational program offered in the high school.

"We are going to need electronic and other technicians, and you are doing a good job in training your young people," he said.

The company was officially welcomed to town by Mayor Erv Hyde.

"You had an expansion and we certainly hope it will be in Georgetown," he said. "I can assure you your investment here will prosper and town and company can prosper together."

Frank Ferguson, speaking for the Jaycees, explained the club's value in training young men for leadership in civic affairs. George Farrow was dinner chairman. Bruce John Elton, said Grace and Bob Burke led in reciting the Jaycee creed.

Past president Gordon Sampson expressed thanks to Mr. Anderson for his address.

Sandy MacKinnon chaired the committee which arranged the evening.
