Says Taxes Going Down... But Not Next Year

Reiterating his statement of two months ago, Mayor Erv Hyde in a Saturday morning radio address told his Georgetown listeners that the peak of taxation has been reached and forecast a downward trend in future years.

However, he made no promise that next year would see the decrease.

He said that because of surface treatment on many roads this year, there would be less maintenance and more to spend on permanent improvements in 1964.

"I suggest that the 1964 road budget can easily include up to \$50,000 for storm sewers, curbs, gutters and permanent services," he said, "without any tax increase."

He stressed that the town's debentured debt should not be increased, other than for essential such as capital school costs. And he said that a new subdivision control by-law, maintaining a 60-40 ratio on a sliding scale will be established within the next few weeks.

"I believe the by-law is realistic from the developer's viewpoint and that the taxpayer cannot be penalized," he said.

They joined representatives from the Chamber of Commerce, Jaycees, Red Cross, Barbershop, Singers, YMYWCA, Local Council of Women, Lions Club, Women's Institute, Rotary Club, Kiwanis, Business and Professional Women, I.O.O.F., Canadian Legion and Little Theatre at a meeting to discuss the Senior Citizens Club organization.

Those organizations that will be contributing to the Senior Citizens monthly program in some way will first be invited to the meeting where they will be asked to make a contribution to the fund. Each will conduct a separate Senior Citizens Club meeting in rotation.

The first guest speaker will be F. M. Dalton of the U.C.I. (University of the City of Ottawa) Prisons Branch of the Dept. of Education, who will address the meeting on the possibilities of a club for senior citizens here.

Behind the Scenes

A vast network of trained and skilled specialists work behind the scenes to make Canada's free blood transfusion service an outstanding example of other countries of the world to emulate.

In Ontario, blood is collected at Red Cross Clinics which are held periodically in every community in the province. Rushed to Area Deposits, it is tested, classified and stored ready to fill the needs of Hospital Blood Banks. At the Bank further tests are carried out to eliminate any chance of error.

EXACTING TESTS The job is to determine what group the patient is in and select compatible blood from the Bank. Then a cross match between the pilot tube on the bottle and the patient's blood is done. 95% of all cases are compatible, but even a routine crossmatching

takes up to two hours. In patients getting the wrong type of blood, the consequences can be fatal.

AN INCREASING NEED To those who work at a Hospital Blood Bank, the need for more blood is a constant one. In fact, the need is increasing. In fact, the need is increasing. In fact, the need is increasing.

NEW OPERATIONS POSITION The Red Cross, the hospital transfusion service is the best way yet devised to meet the needs of the hospitals and clinics that use special blood. It has been possible to have blood sent to the hospital in the form of a "blood pack" which is a container that can be used in the hospital. This is a great improvement over the old method of sending blood in bottles.

Impresses Businesswomen With Indian Culture Talk

Members of the Business Women's Club were especially honored at their monthly dinner meeting on Monday, October 28 to have as their guest speaker, Mrs. Ethel Brant Monture. Mrs. Monture is associated with the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews. She is the great-granddaughter of the famous Chief of the Six Nations Indians, Joseph Brant. She is regarded as one of the great living authorities on Indian Culture and History and is the author of several books.

Mrs. Monture is very proud of her heritage and speaks with a calmness and serenity that is most impressive, particularly in this day and age when one is used to persons with loud voices shouting for attention. For she has a calm, dignified, and cultured of the Indians and living to give a true picture of them as a race of people to be proud of.

She had one man show at the Upstairs Gallery, Toronto in 1958 and 1959. In 1960 she was elected a member to the Canadian Society of Painters in Watercolor and to the Canadian Society of Graphic Art. In 1962 she was elected a member to the Society of Canadian Painters and Etchers.

Mrs. Monture exhibited at many Group Shows, including the Royal Academy, London, the Ontario Society of Artists, the Hamilton Spring Show and the British Columbia Biennial.

In 1963 she won the first prize in the International Art Exhibition at Vichy, France for the International Feminine and Calligraphic of France and in 1964 she won the Prix International at the International Exhibition of the same group.

From 1961 to 1963 Mrs. Monture was Art Director at the University Settlement, Toronto. She is mentioned in the American Who's Who in Art and in the Belgian and Moscow Art magazines. She is living with her family in Toronto.
