Three Get Jail Terms For Theft Convictions

A gang of Georgetown and district youths who went on a two-month rampage of break-ins and thefts, were given jail sentences with hard labour totaling 39 months, in county court Monday.

Two youths were jointly charged with the theft of chocolate bars and other articles from a refreshment booth at the North Halton Kart track near Lame house September 15th.

For his part in the robbery, one was sentenced to three months of hard labour.

The other was released on probation for a year when it was learned he had no previous record.

For their parts in the breaking, entering and theft from the summer residence of O. D. Vaughn of Esqueving on Oct. 22nd, two youths from Georgetown and one from Stawartstown were sentenced to three months hard labour. The Stawartstown youth drew a suspended sentence of three months, and appeared later to be sentenced to three months definite and three months indefinite for his part in another robbery on Oct. 23 when the Spriggins cottage in Esqueving was broken into and robbed.

For their part in this robbery the two Georgetown youths were given a year definite and six months indefinite jail terms.

Magistrate K. M. Langdon in passing sentences said he was impressed by the similarity in the backgrounds of the accused.

"This court always feels sympathetic towards juvenile offenders," said the magistrate.
