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## Norval Girls Roughed Up

The members of a 12-girl gang have admitted "roughing up" two Norval girls, while they were out for a walk Sunday afternoon.

According to a report from the Herald's Norval correspondent, the two Norval girls were walking on the outskirts of the village when the gang, all outside town girls, started harassing the pair by using foul language.

When that didn't draw a response the gang started pelting them with stones. Allegedly they then approached them, scratched them and pulled their hair.

The Norval girls ran to a farm house and phoned their parents, while the gang milled around the gate waiting for them to come out. When the father of one of the girls arrived the little mob turned on him with more cursing.

The man called in the police who apprehended three of the gang. Under questioning they admitted their parts in the affair.

The Norval girls did not press charges. Police, however, had their harassers who gave Brampton addresses, apologize to them. Police also stated they would notify the parents of those apprehended.

"We read of this sort of thing happening in other places, but this is the first time it has involved local girls," one Norval resident said.

"We hope it doesn't occur again. It's a regrettable situation when girls are not safe when they go for a short walk."
