**Esqueuing Growth, School Board Plans 6 More Rooms**

A projected enrollment of 1,287 in two years resulted in the Esqueuing School Board applying for permission to build an additional five rooms, plus a playground large enough to be used as a classroom when necessary.

At present there are thirty-two rooms in the School Area, with an additional one rented in the Glen Wilhams town hall.

These figures are based on thirty-five children to a class.

The old Pinegrove School will be used by the Nurval, W. L. the Farm Forum and the Nurval Junior Farmers, as a meeting place and community hall.

Esqueuing School Board gave the group permission to use the school for a year, ending September 1, 1964, on the condition that they bear the cost of heating, hydro and minor repairs. At the end of the year the school must be turned back to the Board in the same condition as the group received it.

The Pineview School water and sewage system got a clean bill of health from the Halton Health Unit, "satisfactory" was the verdict.

While the water was judged satisfactory, the Board felt the fountain to be unsatisfactory, it was too small. Consequently the single drinking fountain at Pineview School will be replaced with a double one and the single one will be moved to Nurval School.
