**SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS**

A few weeks ago the Georgetown Anglers & Hunters held a special film night. Their guests on this night included many farmers from this area. It was the club's hope that this film would enable them to introduce it to their neighbours. The theme for the night was 'Farmers & Hunters' relations. To be even more specific they hoped with the farmers help to establish wood lots in the area.

Because of programs such as this, and because they are usually sponsored by conservation clubs, I suspect that much of the public believes that this is something between the farmers and the sportsmen. With so many thousands of acres of forests in southern Ontario, why should we care? The 20th was National Forest Product week and has the primary purpose of drawing the attention of the public to the importance of wood-using industries in the local economy of our communities.

Most people if asked "what are the important industries in our heavily populated southwestern Ontario" rarely think of wood-using as an important one but it is.

Here are some facts to consider. There are over 400 Ontario manufacturing goods with wood. These firms employ over 13,000 people whose salaries or wages total over \$47,000,000. The selling value of these various products is over \$100,000,000.

You could safely say that this area both produces and uses wood products from the cradle to the grave. Dying in this area is a great help to the unemployed, as it supports seven coffin and casket firms in this area, employing over 220 people with salaries totaling nearly three quarters of a million dollars.

In the paper and allied industries we have nearly 50,000 established firms making such items as folding boxes, corrugated boxes, paper bags and asphalt roofing.

We have 180 firms making furniture for home and office. 3 firms making hard wood flooring. 58 making sash and doors and 9 turning out veneers and plywoods.

As our population increases these wood manufacturing industries will become more and more important which points out the necessity of good wood lot management to produce quality saw logs.
