Seconds to go, Beavers Lose Friday Thriller

Georgetown Beavers lost a close 5-4 joust with Brampton Friday and look an 82 hammering from the hard-nosed Neil McNeil crew Sunday to account for their current position on the coast table of the Metro Junior B League Western Division.

In four games the Beavers have dropped three decisions and held Lakeshore Bruins to a tie to stay off complete points poverty.

Friday the Beavers played well enough to add their first win to the records. But a three-point lead was eroded by the Carleton Place team. The edge it had taken Georgetown two periods to construct and Brampton's tally with less than two minutes left meant all the Beavers got for a good night's rest was a silent dressing room.

A crowd of 619, strangely exactly the same number who passed the ticket wicket last Friday, watched the Beavers go about punching two goals into the 71 ps net within 2:20 seconds.

Pete Mayberry, the Montreal Canadian reinforcement showed why he's highly rated as a member of the Bab farm by counting both early goals. Gordon and Bill Campbell assisted on the first one which came off Georgetown's initial thrust after just 8 seconds and number two at 2:20 was a surprise effort.

Brampton scored their only first period goal two minutes later, Corlett from McKersy, and the period ended 2-1.
