Forecast Balanced Books For Esquimes Year-End

According to the auditor's interim statement, Esquimes will again end the year with a surplus. This year the surplus is forecast as a modest \$13, however, surpluses from previous years totals \$18,025. In addition, there is a reserve fund of \$31,647. The interim statement was presented to Council at their Council meeting this week.

Councillor G. Currie was named representative to a joint meeting December 12th, in Milton, to discuss the proposed amalgamation of the Sixteen and Twelve Mile Creek Conservation Authorities.

As the voting delegate, George Currie will vote for the amalgamation. "It is good news," he opined, "the amalgamation will probably reduce costs."
