Approve 4-for-1 Stock Split Provincial Mill Parent Co.

The shareholders of Abitibi Power & Paper Company, Ltd. have approved a by-law which provides for the subdivision of common shares of the company on a four-for-one basis.

Abitibi is the parent company of Georgetown's Provincial Paper Mill.

The approval was granted at a general meeting of shareholders in Toronto, Thursday, November 14th.

"The purpose of splitting the common stock seems clear," said president Paul E. Roberts. "Our common stock has for many months been selling at well over \$40 per share. Ours is the only Canadian publicly owned company in our industry whose shares have been selling at that range."

In the opinion of the directors that this price limits the market of the stock and often prevents the small investor from becoming a shareholder in the growing company, he said.

"You directors feel that the splitting of the shares four-for-one will correct this condition."

Mr. Roberts pointed to the New York newspaper strikes, cost penalties caused by the extremely cold weather and expenses in connection with the start of new facilities for adverse affects on first quarter earnings.
