

## Figure Skating Important For Hockey, Says Bowell

More young Georgetown hockey players should take figure skating lessons, says Ross Smith and Andrew Drenke, president of the Georgetown Figure Skating Club.

Discussing the drop in membership this year, Mr. Bowell said that not nearly enough youngsters are learning the fundamentals of skating before taking a hockey stick in their hands.

"Young fellows could do themselves a lot of good by coming out to lessons and learning how to skate," he said. "Andy Bathgate was one of the best figure skaters ever to come out of Guelph and has obviously helped him in over the past months, but had the NHL."

Mr. Bowell cited other cases where figure skating lessons taught the basics of skating, had assisted hockey players on the entire team in Vancouver. He said he hoped young players would forget the idea that there is something sissified about figure skating and attend the Monday lessons.

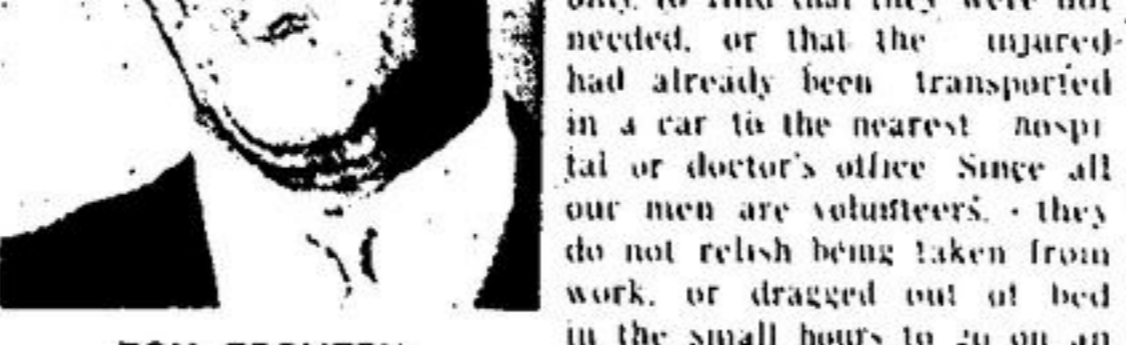
## Set New Procedure For Ambulance Calls

From time to time there have been misunderstandings and unwarranted criticism of the service provided by GVAS in connection with calls to accidents in and around Georgetown.

For the benefit of all who may at some time or other have need of our volunteer service, we point out a long standing regulation of our organization which requires that our men on duty must not accept an accident call unless authorized by police (local or provincial) or a doctor. The reason for this being that in a good number of cases, our vehicle or vehicles have been sent out, only to find that they were not needed, or that the injured had already been transported to a hospital or doctor's office. Since all our men are volunteers, they do not relish being taken from work, or dragged out of bed in the small hours to do an unnecessary trip.

While the above regulation has been in effect for many years, we are now changing this to give a higher standard of service in so far as prompt response to accident calls is concerned.

We ask that all citizens of Georgetown and those places within the Georgetown Fire Area take note that should they be in need of ambulance service, or see an accident in progress, they should immediately telephone our Ambulance Dispatcher at 377-9221 and give full particulars to her, then telephone the Police (local or provincial) with details on the location of the accident, advising that they have already phoned for the ambulance.

## Drop Restriction, Now Anyone Can Call GVAS

Any responsible person may now summon the Georgetown ambulance.

Creed Davidson, secretary of the GVAS, told council Monday that the call system is being broadened in an effort to give speedier service. Till now, only the police or a doctor could direct the ambulance to an accident.

"We realize there might be a few frivolous calls," he said, "but GVAS feels this is better than risking the chance of a more serious injury by a delay in getting a person to the hospital."

Last week council had been asked to okay the new system and had waited a week when Mr. Jim Emmerson asked that Mr. Davidson criticize the council for a possible inference that ambulance volunteers should not pick up injured people without a doctor's authorization.

The new system is not designed to change any procedure other than later arrival at the scene, he said, adding that he thought the matter should be brought in council rather than open an issue.

Actually, we were not asking for authorization only let council know out of our love before we instructed the ambulance dispatcher, he said. Mr. Emmerson referred that he is opposed to accident victims being moved if they are seriously injured, without a doctor's okay.

The service is excellent and the council had no intention of casting any shadow on the volunteer service.
